

Principal's Message

I just wanted to share a few highlights from the virtual presentation on January 20th to parents on 'Supporting Anxious Children' by Sean Larsen. I think this informative presentation helps shed light on what it is like to be a student.

- Anxiety is an emotion, and it is natural. Some anxiety is good, but too much can make it tough for teens to succeed.
- Understanding anxiety in teens, what it does and how it can be regulated is important.
- Brains continue to develop until the mid 20s (girls around 23 and males around 26). This means teenage brains are growing and changing, it is an important time to train them and provide them with the best opportunity for success that we can.
- Teenage brains are unique and still developing (see image below)
- Social evaluation fears are a major cause of anxiety. As parents and educators, it is important to remember these things. We shouldn't get angry when a teen exhibits any of these, rather we should learn how to work with them and help them.
- Anxiety often presents itself by appearing as anger, withdrawal, depression, and learning disabilities.
- Parents can help teens succeed by preparing them for school and social situations, here are a few tips as shared by Sean Larsen:
 - ensure there is routine (predictability) in their lives
 - ensure teens get enough sleep (often they can stay up a bit later but need to sleep in this is normal)
 - encourage and provide a proper diet
 - ensure teens get enough physical activity
 - limit electronics/video games/social media in the evenings causes emotional arousal and harms quality of sleep

Way to Report Absences

One of our greatest priorities is ensuring that all our students arrive safely to school every day. To improve our safe arrival process, we are adding a new system that will make it easier for you to report – and respond to – school absences of your student.

The new student absence reporting system will let you use a <u>mobile app</u>, a <u>web site</u>, or <u>an interactive toll-free</u> <u>phone line</u> to report an absence *in advance*. As a result, it will take the school less time to verify student attendance, and less time to begin to notify parents and guardians of absences that were unexpected or unplanned. This time savings makes it faster and more efficient to account for all students and their safety.

If your student is marked absent and the absence hasn't been explained in advance, our new SafeArrival system will be able to rapidly contact the student's #1 and #2 contact listed in MyEd by automated phone call, text message, email, or mobile app push notification to get a reason for the absence. Calls and contacts will continue until you choose an option to explain the absence.




This new, automated SafeArrival process is part of our SchoolMessenger notification system, and our new SchoolMessenger mobile app for iOS and Android devices. It'll be available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, to make it convenient for you to report future absences.

Mr. Gulyas' PE 8 and 9: Fitness, Skills and Survival



Wow, I would just like to say how impressed I have been with my PE 8s and 9s. They have shown such strength and determination. There have been failures, falls and crashes along the way. Yet these students have shown their resilience and grit while we worked together in class.

Grade 8s and 9s have been working on their fitness on the local crosscountry ski trails. Grade 8s skied the trails around the school and the Water Tower, the golf course, as well as tried to ski to Boivin Cabin; however, due to snow conditions (too sticky), they had to turn around. Grade 9s have also been working hard, skiing local trials, as well as making their own. Their most epic adventure this year was skiing from the school to Wild Cat Cabin, a 16.5 km loop. There were crashes and falls along the way, yet students showed their strength and determination to complete this challenging adventure.

Moving into skills and survival, both the grade 8s and 9s have been working on avalanche skills and shelter

building. Thanks to Avalanche Canada, they lent the PE program a "Tool Box," chalked full of gear; such as, beacons, probes, shovels, saws and snow science kits. Students had the chance to see this gear in action with an online interactive Avalanche Canada presentation and then had the opportunity to have a hands on experience outside in their local backcountry during class. Students had rescue scenarios where they searched for beacons buried in the snow, probe down and





dig out the transceiving beacon. Overlaid with the avalanche skills, was a winter survival unit, where students were building fires and quinzhees. Students worked together in small groups to pile snow, hollow out their shelters and lay down pine for insulation from the ground. I was very impressed with student's abilities to stay strong in the elements, teamwork, preparedness and positive attitudes in the wilderness.

Thank you to Avalanche Canada for the Tool Box, and support along the way. Thank you to the Lions Club, and United Steel Workers Union for the supporting this program's transportation costs. Thank you to parents/guardians, for supporting your students in coming to school with the right gear and equipment. Finally, thank you to the students for your determination and hustle, you made these adventures truly memorable.

Careers 9 Careers "Try a Trade"

In Careers 9 class, we spent some time trying the trades of Electrical, Drywall Installer, and Drywall Finisher. Each student had to cut some drywall, install it on a frame, then put a hole through it with a hammer and go through the process of repairing it. They also had to wire a switch and a light.

Try a Trade serves several purposes. First, it exposes students to some practical real-life skills that they may use in the future. It also gives them a taste of what it would be like to be in that trade. This experience will help students decide if they would like to apply for a Trade program in the future. We hope to expand the program with plumbing, mechanics, painting, concrete, and cooking. Students are also exposed to the welding, carpentry, cabinetry, and culinary trades in other classes.



Elkford Secondary School PAC

Each year the ESS PAC distributes funds for extracurricular materials and activities for our students. This ranges from presentations at our school and help with field trips to maintaining equipment that has previously been purchased by PAC. 





Introducing the Family Portal

Enhancing Communication with Parents and Students

School District 5 (Southeast Kootenay) is launching the <u>MvEducation BC Family Portal</u> in three phases. Phase One of the launch will include the following schools:

- Mount Baker Senior Secondary
- Elkford Secondary

<u>MvEducation BC</u> is the system used across the province for managing student information such as attendance and report cards. The family portal allows parents to have access* to the <u>MvEducation</u> BC system where you can view report cards, attendance, demographics, and progress towards graduation.

(*not all features may be available in the Family Portal initially)

Benefits of the MyEducation BC Family Portal:

- Parents can easily access their child's report card
- Increases the security and privacy of student information. With the Family Portal, report cards are stored and accessed on a secure web server as opposed to <u>sent</u> out via email or on paper.
- Parents can view up-to-date attendance information on the same day it is entered.
- Parents can view demographic information and contact the school should updates/changes need to be made

In the next few days, you will receive an email from MyEd BC providing you with your username and password to access the Family Portal. You will also receive an email from the school with further instructions on how access the portal. Please add sysadmin@myeducation.gov.bc.ca to your address book to make sure it does not end up in your junk mail. The message will look like this:
