We are looking forward to semester two. In the coming weeks we will see our graduating students working hard to raise money for their year end celebrations and prepare for their graduation on May 31 and June 1. It is wonderful to see how supportive our community is for our grads. Our basketball teams are at the peak of their season, and we have two more ski days planned in February and March. February is also Black History month, and we are celebrating it with information, education, food, and games.

In the coming weeks we will begin preparing students for their course selection for next year. It may seem early to think about next year, but information about the classes students need and want help inform the decisions we make for the courses we offer. I sent a survey out last week to gather interest about having a music program. We had approximately 25% of parents from our school population respond. Those responses were overwhelmingly in favour of having a music

program at Sparwood Secondary. The next step will be to collect this information from our students when they make their course selections.

We work hard to keep our attendance records accurate and up to date. Teachers take attendance in the first few minutes of class. If a student is late, they need to check in at the office, get a late slip and go to class. Once the student arrives in class, the teacher will adjust their attendance to mark the student as late and record the time they arrive. If the student does not go straight to class, their teacher does not know the student has arrived and the attendance does not get changed. This is why there is sometimes a discrepancy between a student being at the school and a student being in class. To avoid any confusion, please communicate with the office any time your child will be absent or late and remind your children to talk to their teacher when they arrive in class and hand in the late slip. We care about knowing when our students arrive in their class.

A Message from the Vice-Principal

Black History Month

I'm proud to announce that our school is taking steps to recognize Black History Month during February. Our planning committee is comprised of students, staff, and community members, some of whom are from our local Black community. Black History Month at Sparwood Secondary will celebrate the triumphs and contributions of Black individuals to history and culture, aligning with the 2024 theme of 'Black Excellence: A Heritage to Celebrate; a Future to Build.' Since this marks the first formal recognition of Black History Month at our school, we will dedicate time at the beginning of the month to help our school community understand the history and purpose behind it. Throughout February, members of the Black community in the Elk Valley will provide experiential learning opportunities for our students and staff, fostering a better understanding of Black culture.

AI and Education

Navigating AI and its benefits and consequences in education is certainly a hot topic right now. While some may worry that AI will eliminate creative and critical thinking in schools, others seek to understand how to maximize the potential AI offers students. Recently, I read a study* comparing academic results from students who relied solely on AI, students who relied solely on a teacher, and students who used a combination of learning from a teacher and using AI to supplement learning. In this study, the group of students using a combination of AI and a teacher ended up being very successful, as they could fill in gaps when teaching styles and points did not match individual student levels of understanding. Students could also use AI to help explain what they were trying to learn in alternative and/or simpler ways. More than ever, our students have an abundance of technology at their disposal. I hope that students who choose to use AI do so responsibly and in a way that benefits their learning as well as their potential.
