#### **Learning Extension Afternoons**

One of the most important goals we have as a school team is to engage our students in their learning. With this goal in mind, we will be changing the schedule of eight of our school days this year to provide an afternoon of deeper learning experiences.

When we have a scheduled Learning Extension afternoon, we will have three shorter classes of 54 minutes in the morning. The morning start time and lunch bell will remain the same. For the afternoon, we will have one longer class for the duration of the afternoon. Dismissal time at the end of the day will also remain the same. The intention of this time is to provide teachers with the opportunity to engage their classes in active learning experiences and build positive relationships.

Some of these learning experiences might include:

-cross curricular learning with another class

-inviting a guest speaker to share content knowledge or experiences

-taking students outside for place-based learning

-taking students out in the community to build community connections

-participating in a lab

-planning art, music or cooking opportunities that take more than the usual amount of class time

-exploring math centres for hands on application of math skills

This time will be varied from teacher to teacher.

Attendance is very important! The learning opportunities and projects created during these days will not be easily replicated with a homework assignment or worksheet. One of the outcomes of this plan is to also build stronger connections with peers and with the classroom teacher. Strong relationships to the school community are one of the characteristics of student success. I will be seeking feedback from teachers and students throughout the school year. If you have feedback you would like to share, please let us know. We will have one Learning Extension afternoon per class in each semester. Our first Learning Extension Afternoon was scheduled for Thursday, November 16.

The schedule for these days is as follows:

#### A Message from the Vice-Principal

We've had a great start to our year at Sparwood Secondary, and I have very much enjoyed continuing to grow the relationships with our students, staff, and families that I began cultivating last year. One notable change we have made this year is for our graduates. There is no more Capstone booklet as there had been in the past, as much of the feedback surrounding the Capstone booklet was not positive. This year we have moved to my Blueprint platform for students to complete the CLC portion of the Capstone course which students can access from their Portal homepage. my Blueprint is an exceptional platform for delivering the BC Careers curriculum, and as such, may be used in CLE for Grade 10s, as well as for students in Grades 8 and 9. We hope the switch will provide students a better understanding to complete coursework required for the CLC/Capstone program and will be easier to access and harder to lose.

As we saw measured improvement last year in attendance, we have tightened up our own standards on acceptable attendance rates for the school year. Last year, families were alerted when students had unexcused lates and absences accounting for at least 17% of their classes. This year, we have targeted 15% as our school goal for unexcused lates and absences. Year over year, we will be moving towards a 10% target. Students who have greater than a 10% rate of unexcused lates and absences for their classes are recognized by academic researchers as students who see a dramatic reduction of academic achievement, as well as an increase in risky behaviours. If you know your child is going to be late or absent for a class, please use the school Messenger app, or call the office to excuse them.



# Social Studies


