1. COMMENCEMENT OF MEETING

1.1 Call to Order

The Advocacy/Education Committee Meeting of January 24, 2022, was called to order at 9:33 a.m. by Co-Chair Trustee Whalen.

4. REPORTS

4.1 DSAC Report

Co-Chair Trustee Bellina reported:

- The DSAC met virtually on November 29, 2021.
- Gail Rousseau was thanked for her work over the years with DSAC.
- Overnight trips may still proceed; however, Interior Health Authority states that students cannot stay overnight with individuals from different households; additional rooms would be required. Parents would also need to be able to pick students up should they become ill.
- New technology Jennifer Roberts and Kim Froehler lead the students in an online escape room game called Comic Crusaders. The teams worked together to solve the puzzles. Participants from Mount Baker Senior Secondary won a prize.
- Cellphone Administrative Procedure will be discussed in the Policy Committee meeting on January 24.
- Students thought about and discussed leadership. (Are people born leaders or is it a learned behaviour?) The participants discussed qualities needed to be a leader. These qualities included the ability to lead and understand, guide others, be adaptable, be unbiased and be able to manage people.
- Director Tichauer reminded students they are "Change agents for the school."
- The next DSAC meeting has not been scheduled. Director Tichauer was hoping to have an in-person meeting; realizing now that this is not an option. Director Tichauer & Amanda will plan a 2-hour virtual meeting.

4.2 DPAC Report

Trustee Johns reported:

- The SOGI 123 presentation was very informative. Trustee Johns thanked the team of presenters.
- Trustee Turner was unable to participate in the January DPAC ZOOM meeting; however, it was reported that both Gordon Terrace Elementary and Kootenay Orchards Elementary Parent Advisory Councils are having issues with obtaining approval for new playground equipment. Parent Advisory Councils were directed to contact Secretary-Treasurer Nick Taylor on the process.

Superintendent Yardley Reported:

- At the January ZOOM meeting there was a conversation regarding COVID-19. Superintendent Yardley discussed functional closures and staff shortage protocols.
- The EASE presentation was very informative.

4.3 Framework for Enhancing Student Learning (FESL) (Items determined by Superintendent)

- **4.3.1** FESL Project District Principal Verbeurgt reported on the third outcome for the Framework for Enhancing Student Learning (Students will feel they have a place to belong in our schools and our society)
- The network of connections students make help to foster the feelings of belonging within their schools and in society. When students feel they belong it gives them a purpose to be where they are.
- The most important relationships are with the classroom teacher and with each student in the classroom community.
- District Principal Verbeurgt noted, although schools have been adapting to keep kids safe throughout the interference of COVID-19, the learning development has been disrupted. He stated that the expected developmental level of students is changing.
- In the provincial survey, feeling welcome, safe, and belonging, School District 5 students ranked slightly lower than the provincial average. Indigenous students feel welcome and safe at the same level but feel less belonging as they age.
- In the provincial survey, feeling that there are two or more adults that care about them in the school, the School District 5 students ranked slightly lower than average. Grade 7 students reported the lowest percentage and Indigenous students reported lower levels particularly in Grade 7 and 10. Students with diverse abilities and disabilities feeling of being cared for declines in the senior levels.
- Outcome objectives: Improve sense of feeling welcome, safe, and belonging to their school. Improve the percentage of students that feel there are two or more adults who care about them.
- Project area: Grade 7 sense of belonging & care. The goal is to raise the average for all students.
- Jaffray Elementary Junior Secondary began participating in the project in November 2021. The school identified a couple areas they wanted to work on. They would also like to move project to other grades as well. The project has been placed on hold until staff shortages are rectified.
- Amy Woodland held a meeting January 6, 2022, with the School Based Team.
 They would like to build a more welcoming space and softer start to the day. This would help students that arrive late not feel they are missing out. Release time will be provided to teachers for them to strategize.
- Learning series on Rainbow of Learning provides staff with the opportunity to educate themselves towards the objectives.
- Funding has been provided to schools to create Aboriginal Welcoming Spaces.

- Youth Care Workers attended mini conference about social emotional learning and trauma in October 2021.
- School leaders and staff should understand the importance of the impact students' feelings have when it comes to having students trying to achieve their full potential.

Questions/comments:

 Trustee Ayling: Grade 7 &10 are transition grades for a lot of schools. What can be done to support those students as they move to new school?

Student Services give advanced visits to their new schools for those students that require longer integration. Dialogue happens between outgoing schools and incoming schools. Some students start transition in March, while the remainder begin in June. Some schools host a Welcome Week for students entering a new school during the first week back from summer holidays.

 Trustee McPhee: Staff need to be able to identify the students that will be falling out of the system. How do we support them and assist them?

Drilling down into the data. Darcy and Diane will investigate attendance and other at-risk behaviours. They will also speak to the people on the ground that interact with the students daily.

Co-Chair Trustee Bellina: Why did schools not want to do it at district level?
 Schools look at their data themselves and could then measure and interpret.

Chairperson Lento commented on behalf of Co-Chair Trustee Turner that the second bullet on the first page of the Policy should use the word "expects" rather than "encourages". Co-Chair Trustee Turner also noted that 6.4.3 should honour student choice.

Director Tichauer reviewed issues in Policy 19 with respect to legal requirements of the Mature Minor Act (what age do students have the ability to change their preferred name?)

Proposed changes will be made to Policy 19 and will be reviewed and brought forth at the next Policy Committee meeting on February 22, 2022.

5.2 Administrative Procedure 145 - Use of Cell Phones and Digital Devices

Director Tichauer reviewed the District Student Advisory Council (DSAC) feedback on Administrative Policy 145. The DSAC noted that Administrative Procedure 145 did not state that that cell phones and digital devices may be used to support student learning.

Trustee Damstrom commented that the DSAC feedback was well thought out and articulate. She also appreciated being included in the feedback responses.

Director Tichauer advised that Administrative Procedure 145 will be reviewed. He will also continue to take School District 5 Administrative Procedures that require student input to the DSAC.

5.3 Financial Report Policies

Secretary Treasurer Taylor reviewed the presentation that was included in the agenda package. The Ministry is wanting transparency in financial report policies and the goal is to ensure that School District 5 polices are updated to be aligned with the Financial Planning and Reporting Accumulated Surplus policies from the Ministry of Education.

Secretary Treasurer Taylor will provide further updates at the February 22, 2022 Policy Committee meeting.

Our Youth Care Worker (YCW), Dana McLean, is providing sessions with three classrooms on interoception. Interoception is defined as the senses of internal state of body both conscious and non-conscious. These sessions will continue at both Highlands Elementary School (HES) and TMRES. The YCW is continuing with three separate programs in kindergarten to grade 3 for girls and is working on setting up a boys group focussing on Gr. 5 & 6 at both schools.

It was asked when we would be expanding this program to the Elk Valley. Senior Management reminded that this program was identified for Cranbrook only and additional programing would have to come at an additional cost outside the Student Services budget. Or, to stop doing something within the current scope of Student Services. A brief discussion was had on the social emotional program at Frank J. Mitchell Elementary (FJMES). A request was made to have principal Atwal present on this at a future meeting.

2.2 Report regarding disproportional spent Special Education budget over what is targeted by the Ministry of Education.

British Columbia Teachers Federation (BCTF) states that the School District spends disproportionately more than budgeted. District Principal Verbeurgt and Shelley Balfour will obtain information from the BCTF, where we are province wide, prior to the next meeting.

Trustee Johns referenced the need for this report as soon as possible. That preparation of the report should proceed before the next Select Standing Committee meeting. We should be advocating for supports now and leaving it until September.


Thoughts on January,



mental health tips for you and your family

Having to flee your home, leave animals or possessions behind and relocating can cause distress, fear and anxiety for you and your loved ones. Remember that these are some of the most stressful events one can experience. Whether you are coping with fire, flood, earthquake or an other emergency dealing with your physical safety, here are some proven tips to help you cope with the mental stress of a natural disaster.

Take care of the basics

Try to eat well and get enough sleep. Sleep and nutrition are more important than ever.

Be kind to yourself

Set realistic expectations and be patient with yourself and others.

Give and accept support

Expect to feel angry, sad, confused or just numb—and talk to others about it.



Get back to your daily routine

Doing things as simple as brushing your teeth can help restore a sense of safety and control.



Take a break

Take breaks from disaster news coverage and from thinking and talking about the events.

Check in on older people around you. Coping may be more difficult for older adults living alone, those with mental health problems or with few social supports. Reaching out to connect with them can be a big help.

When to seek more help

Most people, if given support, will recover almost completely from the fear and anxiety caused by a traumatic experience within a few weeks. However, some will need more help to heal. It's important to watch for the following signs and contact a medical professional if they last more than 2 to 4 weeks:

- Trouble with sleeping and eating
- Feeling depressed or hopeless, showing low energy or crying often
- Being anxious and fearful

- Trouble focusing on daily activities
- · Recurring thoughts or nightmares about the event
- Avoiding activities or places that are reminders of the event

Elkford Secondary's Adventure Club


