Seasons Greetings, Merry Christmas, Happy Hanukkah, Happy Hogmanay, Festive Yule, Merry Festivus and Happy Solstice. Whatever your selective reason to celebrate, be it filled with the warmth of family. Daylight will be slowly increasing in our frozen north and that unto itself is cause for celebration. For those who are sneaking off to warmer climates for the Winter Break, travel safely and keep yourself well covered with blankets and towels when out on the sunny beaches. In Canada, snow burn indicates a great day on the ski hill. An overall tan, however - never mind, just enjoy your vacation to the fullest.

What has the Board of Education been up to?

A new principal was hired for Highlands Elementary School. We wish Steve Rogers, current principal, and his family great success with his retirement. Coming from personal experience, there isn't a lot of downtime with retirement. It's more of a process of switching vocations or interests. Good luck with all of that! We also welcome Bill Johnson to our community as the new principal. Bill is working for SD5, most recently as the principal of Fernie Secondary School. He brings a wealth of experience to his new school and his family will be a welcome addition to the community.

The Supreme Court of Canada ruled to restore class size language in the teachers' contract that was deleted by the provincial government in 2002. During the last round of bargaining a reopening clause was agreed upon which would bring the union and government back to the table and discuss implementation of the 2002 class size language subject to a ruling of that nature in the Supreme Court. Both groups have been meeting and there are strong indications that the public want the changes reflected sooner, rather than later. The financial implication of the 2002 provisions and the source of funding required to support those changes have yet to be determined and will be determined at the provincial level of negotiations. In the interim, the district will be conducting research into nature of changes that would take place under the 2002 provisions.

"Conversation about Rural Education"

As indicated in an interview with Summit 107, Thursday, December 15th, the Board of Education for School District 5 have some

concerns about the short timelines and lack of information provided by the Ministry of Education leading up to feedback sessions defined as, "Conversation about Rural Education".

Monday, November 21, 2016

"The Province is seeking public input on rural education as part of a strategy being created by Parliamentary Secretary for Rural Education Linda Larson to better understand the needs of students, parents, schools and communities in rural B.C.

Until Jan. 9, 2017, British Columbians can join in the online discussion to share stories on rural education and thoughts around community development at:

A draft discussion paper will then be developed and posted online for further public comment, followed by several regional meetings that will be hosted by Larson. Stakeholder groups may also submit formal submissions to government, which will be posted online."

1. The Battle of Two Pay Period a Month for TTOC

The Accounting and Human Resources Departments implemented accounting and tracking software a number of years ago that does an adequate job of tracking all employees' hours of work and providing payment for those services twice a month. For reasons of contract, this same services is not provided to TTOCs in our district and, according to BCPSEA, needs to negotiated. We have had lengthy discussions on this lack of service and the position of BCPSEA. The board has written a letter to the BCPSEA indicating our position on this matter in hopes that all employees with SD5 can be treated equally.

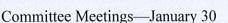
Christmas in our Communities 2016

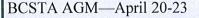

Work on the Revised Curriculum Continues

Our K – 9 revised curriculum is in the first year of implementation and the draft Graduation Years is available for feedback on the ministry website. Meanwhile, work in our district continues with staffs incorporating inquiry learning, project-based learning or place-conscious learning into their lesson planning. Our second Curriculum-focused, Non-Instructional day will be on February 24th, 2017 and our Curriculum Committee has recommended that staffs continue to work within their own school on further developing their plans. The feedback from our first day in September was overwhelmingly positive and Leyton Schnellert certainly helped to reassure teachers that much of the work they were already doing was incorporating the revised curriculum and he was able to provide some excellent examples of some further work that could be done to enhance the work. Based on the feedback, staffs felt strongly that they could use the time for further planning and incorporating some of the ideas that have been presented.

British Columbia Students are Leading the World in Reading, Science and Math

Once again, our BC students (including randomly selected classes within our district) performed extremely well on the 2015 Programme for International Student Assessment (PISA). This test assesses the performance of 15 year old students in reading, science and math among seventy-two countries, all 10 Canadian provinces and 79 BC school districts. Here are the highlights:

- Between 2012 and 2015, BC increased its relative standing in all three areas.
- BC students achieved the highest average score in reading in PISA 2015. No countries performed above BC's range. Ten jurisdictions performed at BC's range, and 71 jurisdictions performed below.
- In science, only Singapore outperformed BC statistically. Ten
 jurisdictions, including Canada as a whole, performed in BC's
 range, including Alberta which statistically tied with BC. Seventy jurisdictions performed below BC's range.
- In math, five jurisdictions performed above BC statistically, 12 jurisdictions performed at the same level as BC, and 64 performed below.

Parties Reach Priority Measures Memorandum of Agreement

Representatives of the BC Public School Employers' Association (BCPSEA), the BC Teachers' Federation (BCTF), the Public Sector Employers' Council (PSEC) Secretariat, and the Ministry of Education (MoE) have today reached agreement on a Priority Measures Memorandum of Agreement as a first step in responding to the decision of the Supreme Court of Canada.

The Priority Measures Memorandum of Agreement

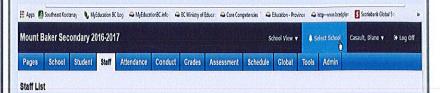
The Ministry of Education will provide \$50 million in net new funding for British Columbia's public education system for the balance of the 2016/17 school year. The parties have agreed that this funding represents the monetary equivalent of approximately 1000 - 1100 teacher FTE, depending on experience, qualifications and district-specific compensation variation.

The \$50 million in net new funding will be used to add additional enrolling and non-enrolling teacher FTE during the 2016/2017 school year;.

Where it is not feasible to use the net new funding to add additional enrolling or non-enrolling teacher FTE during the 2016/2017 school year it may be used to fund other school district-level capacity building initiatives to support teachers.

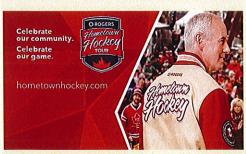
The MyEducationBC system has been upgraded to release 5.6 and has a slightly new look and feel.

Update from the Director of Instruction/HR

Staffing for the current school year continues for secondary schools as second semester blocks have been posted and are in the process of being filled. To date, there have been just over 180 teacher postings and 135 CUPE postings for the 2016-2017 school year.

The District will be having a Joint Occupational Health and Safety training session for all school reps on those committees in late February. This training will allow each school to have the necessary tools/processes/procedures to properly function as a JOHS committee at each school/district site. These committees are necessary under the WSBC regulations which in turn allows School District 5 to operate in a safe manner for all of its employees.

With the recent Supreme Court decision, the provincial parties have reached a Priority Memorandum Agreement. Some of the details of the memorandum include an influx of 50 million dollars into speciality teaching positions for districts across the province. District management and the local teacher presidents will be meeting shortly to analyze district priorities for the funds being allocated to SD5.

As directed by the provincial parties, District Management and the CFTA have also gone through a recent process to analyze collective agreement language of 2002. The purpose of the exercise was to determine any stumbling blocks to the old language being implemented in today's current working conditions.

6 year completion rates

We were excited to receive our 6 year completion rates from the Ministry right before the break. Our Aboriginal completion rate is the highest it has ever been! I will be preparing the annual report on our full results this month.

Skills Training

We have applied for a large Capital Equipment grant for resources for our middle and high school Industrial Ed spaces. We are waiting to hear if we are successful!

Jesse Miller, a highly sought after national speaker on the topics of social media awareness, social networking behavior and online content evaluation, visited Cranbrook Middle Schools on January 12, 2017 and spoke about digital citizenship, media literacy, and informed and safe social media use. He also presented to parents at an evening session at the Key City Theatre!

Update from the District Principal/Student Services

For a week in December, Darcy Verbeurgt, Julie Russchen and Stacey Short attended a training session called Mandt to become trainers in our District. This training replaces Nonviolent Crisis Intervention training previously used in SD 5. The Mandt System focuses on the relationship development understanding of human behaviour to become preventative and proactive in handling escalating behaviours. The focus of the training is on avoiding and de-escalating undesirable behaviours. While it does have a physical restraint component, this portion of the training will only be used in situations where it is absolutely necessary as a last resort. It keeps in mind the safety of both the student and staff. This training model is more in line with our draft Restraint and Seclusion Policy and Procedures. Training of education staff will begin this month.

Joe Tank and Darcy Verbeurgt have been completing a facilities accessibility review for all of our district buildings. In particular there has been a focus on improving physical, visual and auditory access. They have created a work list for each building. This review fortunately coincides with a grant opportunity called Access4All - Removing Barriers, sponsored by the Rick Hanson Foundation and the Canadian govern-

ment as a 150th celebration event. In addition to the physical changes to each building there will be an awareness component for staff, students and the public. More to come as we how we do in the grant process.

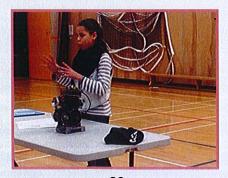
Inquiry and Technology in the Classroom
