1.6.1. Mardelle Sauerborn - Outdoor Classroom Knook Project

Superintendent Hauptman introduced Mardelle Sauerborn who is the Kindergarten teacher at FJMES. Ms. Sauerborn has started the Outdoor Classroom Knook Project which creates outdoor learning spaces in which our students can become environmental stewards of our earth. Ms. Sauerborn presented a slide show. Highlights included:

- Students are able to make their own observations.
- Students are able to take ownership of the project.
- Students learn the impact that others can make in their environment.
- Allows students to make choices.
- Partnering with older students.
- · Partnering with the Ktunaxa people.

Discussion included:

- Many school districts have this as well.
- Would be open to sharing information on this project with others.
- This is an example of how curriculum is changing.

Superintendent Hauptman reported that FJMES will be receiving a National Inclusive Education Award from the Canadian Association for Community Living and Inclusion BC. The staff at FJMES are being honoured for creating a culture of inclusion at the school, recognizing the unique abilities of all students.

1.6.2. Nicole Pallone - PKU Presentation

Superintendent Hauptman introduced Nicole Pallone who is a parent of a child with PKU and has also become an advocate for families that have children with PKU. PKU is a recessive genetic disorder. Ms. Pallone presented a power point highlighting the following:

- Affects approx. 1 in 15,000 newborns.
- Brain threatening disorder.
- Managed by diet, must restrict protein.
- If left untreated it can mean minor neurocognitive impairment.

CanPKU offers Key Support

- Awareness
- Advocacy
- Education

What school districts can do?

- Be aware of impacts.
- Be aware how the school handles the PkU treatment regime.
- Be aware that PKU students will require additional help.
- Be aware that CanPKU exists.

2. PRESENTATIONS

2.1 Elementary Skills Training Program – Jason Tichauer

David Doll, Vice-Principal of Gordon Terrace Elementary School brought 3 students with him to exhibit their completed project from the Elementary Skills Training Program. The students were given a project (build a boat of cardboard and duct tape) and then worked together to design and test their boat. This program is unique in that the emphasis for this program was on turning skills into projects. This program will be expanding beyond Cranbrook next year in both Rocky Mountain Elementary and Jaffray Elementary Junior Secondary Schools.

Paul Duczek doing lots of hands-on with craft projects with K-3 students and more problem-based projects with grades 4-6. Through a PLC started a couple of years ago teachers now bring forth ideas to him. These projects incorporate not only a skills component but also the learning aspect of science. Paul would like to see some continuity with certain grades doing certain designed projects.

Discussion included:

How many classes have come through and where do you see program going now? Over 30 classes have gone through so far and some classes come multiple times. Paul would like to see 2 blocks dedicated to this program next year. Material cost and bussing to run the program would be approximately \$2000 per block. Superintendent Hauptman explained that the funding for this is through the BC Education Grant.

Dogwood District Authority Scholarships and Community Bursaries

I just had the honour, with Gail Rousseau and Jason Tichauer, to judge the District Dogwood presentations from 58 students who shared their passions and career aspirations in such a powerful way. In the end forty-eight (48) - \$1000 scholarships have been awarded. In addition to these scholarships, I extend my sincere appreciation to all donors who are making a significant impact on post-secondary opportunities for our students. The community support year after year for our graduating students is outstanding! I had the pleasure of attending the Commencement Ceremonies in the beautifully decorated Community Centre in Sparwood where over \$38,000 in bursaries were awarded!

BC Liquor Stores 2015 Dry Grad Campaign

School District 5 participated in the fourteenth annual fundraising campaign to support alcohol-free graduation celebrations in all of our communities organized by the BC Liquor Distribution Branch (LDB). Elkford Secondary will receive \$158.00, Sparwood Secondary will receive \$711.00, Fernie Secondary will receive \$701.00 and Mt. Baker Secondary will receive \$4,631.00. An Exit Survey will be completed by each school and submitted on behalf of the District which will summarize the allocation of the campaign funding.

Each of the two grades from all over School District 5 and 6 spent an entire day at the College of the Rockies in a conference-style program that included a keynote speaker and breakout sessions. I had the privilege of attending the keynote with the Grade 10 students and one of the breakout sessions on developing positive relationships. The students were very engaged and appreciated this different approach. Officer Nutini's counterparts from all over the province also came and lent a hand during the day and hope to be able to host similar events in their parts of the province as this was the first "conference" of its kind. Congratulations Al Nutini! Special thanks also goes to the College of the Rockies who donated the venue for this worthwhile event.

- Auditors to be in our district the 3rd week of August

Update from the Director of Student Learning and Innovation

Summer Book Give-away

We are extremely excited to be supporting (once again) some of our young readers through the summer months. Our focus again this year is on our more vulnerable or beginning readers. Our District Literacy Support Teacher (Debra Kennedy) will be instrumental in organizing the order while the Education Office support staff will be ensuring all books are mailed in the summer.

Changing Results for Young Readers (CR4YR)

The Ministry funding support has been altered slightly for the 2015-2016 school year. We are in the process of determining what the project will entail. The District still hopes to support educators for the CR4YR Provincial Network Sessions.

Early Childhood Education

SD 5 continues to work in partnership with the Ministry of Education to provide the Early Childhood Educators (StrongStart) in our Region with access to relevant professional development. Although no new centers are being supported we are continuing to work with the 4 presently operating in our communities of Sparwood, Fernie and Cranbrook.

PVP mentoring/training

The mentoring of our new or almost new PVP members will be continuing this coming year. The Directors of Student Learning will be collaborating to offer sessions throughout 2015-16 year. August will kick this off with Learning Leaders from across the Kootenay Boundary region coming together to share innovative ideas around the implementation of the new curriculum.

District Literacy Plan

Although there is no longer a requirement for a district plan to be submitted, the district literacy committee has agreed at its May meeting to continue with three regular meetings throughout the year to stay current regarding the literacy of our communities.

Technology Update

Our technology roll-out continues as planned with the remainder of the middle/secondary schools to be started during the summer months. Conversations are continuing with schools to ensure technology requests, needs and purchases are in line with the technology plan while at the same time addressing the educational needs of students and teachers.

MyEducationBC initial Train the Trainer is complete and data validation is scheduled for August 2015. Data conversion will be done once the Year End Transition (YET) is complete. On August 24th all SD 5 schools will be converted. Training and support will continue with all folks during the 2015-16 year. BCeSIS will no longer be accessible as of December 2015. Two district members have been included in the provincial team discussions: Dot Galvin: Assessment and Reporting Working Group as well at Carmen Murray: Reports Developers' Group.

Update from the District Principal/Student Services

The Education Fund portion of the Learning Improvement Fund has begun. Consultations have occurred between principals and education staff, submissions were collected, summarized and presented to Senior Management for decisions. Some staffing will occur this spring. The remaining majority of the funds will be allocated with the second round of LIF legislated consultation in the fall, followed by LIF staffing in October.

The Support Staff portion of Learning Improvement Fund has begun, and it will increase elementary Education Assistant time by 15 minutes each day, as we have done for the past three years. There will also be enough to place three additional EAs across the District.

A number of file reviews will occupy many weeks this spring. Student files requiring intensive behaviour or mental health intervention will be reviewed and renewed if criteria and services are maintained. There are a number of additional student files that need authorization for a special education designation. Teaching and support staff have been allocated for a successful fall start-up.

There is a big focus on mental health with two interagency meetings this month: Mental Health Promotion Collaboration (promotion and prevention); and The Child and Youth Mental Health and Substance Use Collaborative Action Team (intervention and crisis management).

Darcy attended the Health Promoting School Coordinator Conference in Nelson for the Interior Health Authority. The focus was around promoting mental wellness. Topics of discussion and planning included positive psychology, transgendered youth, creating healthy spaces in schools and use of outdoor classroom spaces.

We held our last Enhancement Agreement Review Committee meeting of the year at the St. Mary's Band Hall and had a very productive discussion of how Aboriginal Perspectives and Worldviews is embedded in the new curriculum and Graduation Plan. We were also able to set up the structure of how we are approaching constructing our new plan. As well, our last AESW meeting of the year will take place this month, and we will be setting new priorities for next year.

Visit with Larry Espe, Ministry of Education

We were very fortunate to visit with Larry Espe, Superintendent from the learning division at the Ministry. Larry was treated to an excellent presentation from Mike Kelly, Vice-Principal at SSS, on Sparwood Secondary's many innovative programs including their recently completed Medieval May. As well, Larry had a tour of some of the trades and elective programs at MBSS. The robotics team put on a great presentation again! We were also fortunate to have Larry connect with Stan Chung from COTR to discuss some of our many inventive partnerships.

Erase Training

Level 3 ERASE training occurred this past month, and was an excellent 'next step' in our district's training. It involved the formation of community-based teams to work on the next stages of Risk Assessments. We were able to get a good sampling of our Principals, Counsellors, AESWs and YCWs training to work on these important Safe School teams.
