

Dear students, staff, parents and caregivers:

Welcome back! I hope you had a restful two weeks with your family enjoying our beautiful communities. Spring Break is always such a great time to rest and recharge as the school year starts to wind down. While we still have plenty of learning to do, this is the time where we start to reflect on the year and the schools and the district start to look at next year.

Kindergarten registration for the 2021/2022 school year is open and most students have registered already. If you know of any kindergarten parents who have not registered their children, or are new to the neighbourhood, please remind them to call the school in their catchment area for our new "COVID" safe registration procedures.

As you may have heard, due to recent changes in cases of COVID-19 in BC, the Provincial Health Officer has recommended changes to the mask requirements for K-12 schools. All staff, adult volunteers and visitors, and all Grade 4 to 12 students are required to wear a non-medical masks or face coverings at all times while indoors at school and on school buses, subject to some exceptions (detailed on Page 30 of the updated <u>SD5 Protocols</u>). Students in Grades K to 3 are encouraged to wear masks, but are not required to do so.

We are in the process of sourcing reusable masks for students although we request that parents/caregivers send their children with masks when returning to school on April 6.

Additional information will be coming directly from your school with respect to the availability of masks and updated school protocols. Please watch for information from your school principal. We will continue to send updates as we get new information.

Bugs, Rodents and Robots

Amy Woodland Elementary School students from Mrs. Kessler's Grade 2 class started their coding journey with the Code-A-Pillars and Coding Mice available from the District Resource Center. They learned about computer languages such as binary and symbols and then programmed their mice and Code-A-Pillars to complete different exploratory challenges. The great thing about the Coding Mice and Code-A-Pillars is how they introduce coding with robotics without any devices and at a level that all students can participate.





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Enhancing Communication with Parents and Students

School District 5 has opened the MyEducation BC student portal at Mount Baker Secondary, Elkford Secondary and Parkland Middle Schools. The student portal was also temporarily set up for students at Fernie Secondary, Sparwood Secondary and Laurie Middle Schools (grade nine students only) to help facilitate the 2021/2022 student course selection process. The student portal provides students with online access to demographic and academic information. Schools and teachers can use the portal to communicate with their students in a variety of ways, including distribution of published reports (i.e., report cards), access to gradebook assignments, and sharing of content.



Students from T.M. Roberts Elementary School Grade 6 French Immersion class were challenged to create an invention using the Lego Spike kits at the design lab. They learned how to code and planned their ideas in a few short classroom sessions before coming to the lab to build their designs. There were toy pets, armoured vehicles and encrypted safes. All the students were excited by the group who followed a complex set of directions to create a Rubik's Cube solver. Most of the projects went through multiple iterations, mistakes and rigour to realize their vision. One of the students who is a self-professed Rubik's Cube aficionado raced the robot and was able to beat it by over a minute!

SchoolMessenger Communicate and SchoolMessenger SafeArrival are being utilized by most schools within School District 5. The SchoolMessenger Communicate system has also been very successfully embraced by our transportation department.

Mental Wellness and the Design Lab

Mr. Cullins brought his physical and health education class from Fernie Secondary School to the design lab to explore how using technology appropriately and working as a team to achieve a goal can have a positive effect on a person's well-being. Students worked together to complete various Lego Spike robotics challenges and others used the time to explore virtual reality. Recent studies show that virtual reality can have positive impacts on a person's mental health.

VR Explorations

Students in Mr. Roszell's class at Elkford Secondary School will be conducting a research project on virtual reality and the brain. Students have been given the opportunity to explore some different virtual reality applications to understand what it feels like to wear and experience a virtual reality headset. Students in Ms. Kennedy's class at Rocky Mountain Elementary School learned about electrical conductivity, computer science and music when they made Jell-O pianos. Students coded 3 notes for their pianos and played music for each other. We invited Principal Ehman to take

Going Above and Beyond with Lego Wedo

Some students from Ms. McMullan's grade 5 class from Rocky Mountain Elementary School were challenged to find a Lego Wedo design that was not from the Lego Wedo app. One group wanted to build and code a shark, while another group built a forklift. Mrs. Froehler built a robo-monkey! Kids can do hard things!



Strawberry DNA Extraction Lab at Sparwood Secondary School

Students in Mr. Powell's Grade 9 Science class at Sparwood Secondary School extracted the DNA from strawberries earlier this month. Students crushed up a mixture of frozen strawberries, salt and dish soap and then added the mixture to a graduated cylinder. Students added alcohol that was chilled to approximately -15 degrees celsius which helped form a layer of DNA material. Students were then able to extract the DNA from the mixture and observe it.

Students were encouraged to think about the composition of DNA and its importance in coding genetic information for all living organisms. They were also able to better understand the fact that DNA is made of the same basic components regardless of the species. Finally, students reflected on the fact that the genes coded in DNA molecules are passed on through sexual and asexual reproduction, and that variation in genes is the driving force for diversity in species and evolution of species. The Grade 9 students were very engaged and asked a lot of great questions!

The staff and students are excited about the new learning opportunities that this equipment will bring. Inclusive Education Committee

The Inclusive Education committee met again on February 24, 2021. Discussions were held about how to best serve our vulnerable students, budget priorities and potential budget redistributions. The Inclusive Education committee is focussed on creating short term, long term and a 3 year plan in regards to budgets and student services. We're thankful for the dedication of this team and their commitment to our vulnerable students.



Student Services - Speech Pathology and Assisted Technology

Communication is a basic need. All people, regardless of their age, status, ability, or communicative capacity have the right to receive and convey messages, to hold opinions, and express themselves. Everyone should uphold others' right to communicate as they interact with people in daily life to enhance equality, justice, and human dignity.

Everyone has the right to freedom of opinion and expression; this right includes freedom to hold opinions without interference and to seek, receive and impart information and ideas through any media regardless of frontiers. (United Nations, 1948)

Speech Language Pathologists use Core Boards and picture symbol communication with non-verbal and low verbal visual learners. The boards contain "core words" which are some of the words we use most frequently.

Students, Jun Mi and Declan, work with their Core Boards at Amy Woodland Elementary School. These students practice and use their vocabulary and expression every day. Communicating builds relationships and a sense of belonging in a group of peers.





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This first week back from Spring Break will hold the annual general meeting of the leaders of Indigenous Education in British Columbia. We are hearing that there may be changes to the Indigenous Education Targeted Funding Regulations, so this will be an important timing for gathering; not just for the usual outstanding examples of practice from around the province, but now potentially for some process-driven discussions as well.

We have recently met with the Indigenous Education student data statistician from the Ministry of Education who has shared some valuable insight into our District's Indigenous student data, as well as hearing our concerns around tracking post-secondary transitions out of province. It sounds like they may have some solutions at the provincial level. More information to come!



Advocacy


The 2020/2021 school year was a year of tremendous growth for our CUPE support employees and we are on our way to well over 250 postings when we normally average 130-150/year.

Our teacher postings will top up at just over 220 this year.

The teacher initiated transfer process will be reviewed at the end of April at the same time we will also look at any necessary district initiated transfers. Once the transfer processes are complete, teacher post and fill for the next school year will begin.

As we move into late May we will begin our intake for teacher teaching on-call opportunities for the 2021/2022 school year.





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Ministry of Education Update

New Assistance for Young Adults from Government Care: Young adults who are participating in the Agreement with Young Adults (AYA) program, or who are eligible to participate, may apply for the Canada-BC Housing Benefit to get help paying their rent. Update on Grade 10 Literacy Assessment (LTE10/LTP10) Exemptions: This year's Grade 12 students are not required to write the Grade 10 Literacy Assessment, including Évaluation de littératie de la 10e année – Français langue première. Please note that schools no longer need to submit spreadsheets for exemptions. The Ministry is applying exemptions to all students in Grade 12 on the BC Graduation Program (2018). The timing of the 'XMT' application may vary depending on the session release date or whether there have been multiple registrations. If concerns, contact TRAX.Support@gov.bc.ca.


