

Thank you to the students who love coming to school ready to learn each day and where they make connections with their peers and adults; this is so important for our students in these times.


Thank you to the Aboriginal Education Support Workers, Youth Care Workers and Education Assistants who find ways to support our children when they need it most.

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Ready, Set, Learn is an initiative that recognizes that families need positive connections with the school system and community agencies that provide relevant resources and information. All public elementary schools in Southeast Kootenay School District will be offering an opportunity for all three to five year olds to connect with their neighbourhood school (children born in 2016, 2017 & 2018 (who have turned three by <mark>the date of the RSL event</mark>). This event is a partnership between the province, the district, and the early childhood teachers in Cranbrook, Fernie, Sparwood, Jaffray, and Elkford.

Each school held their own specific Ready, Set, Learn events over the months of April and May, <mark>each following COV</mark>ID protocols. Parents and caregivers receiv<mark>ed</mark> helpful tips for supporting their preschooler's learning and development. They were also given information about services available in their communities.



"Growing Innovation in Rural Sites of Learning was conceptualized in 2011 by the Rural Education Advisory Committee (REA) and is founded on the assumption that rural schools and communities are both the sites of, and benefit greatly from, innovation. In designing the initiative, the REA defined innovation as a "unique local response to a local need, problem or interest". The REA, which includes participants from school districts, BC

universities and the Ministry of Education, is delighted to support and promote your innovations. To date, the initiative has supported numerous projects which reflect the diversity across our communities and schools in rural BC."

Kootenay Orchards Elementary School was one of the 3 schools to received the Growing Innovation Grant this year to build a movable and organic classroom for their students. It's so exciting to see an outdoor learning table installed on the school grounds



Sparwood Secondary School had a second opportunity to take part in the grant which supported their project, "Join the Circle". Drum circles facilitate inclusion and belonging in addition to playing a part in rehabilitation and mental health. The role of rhythm can also help people overcome trauma and addiction. Drum circles can work well with those uncomfortable expressing themselves in a second language such as French and plays a role in music classrooms as well.



Mandt Training

Education Assistants in the Elk Valley continued with the

physical skills portion of their Mandt training. Due to COVID, some creative and unconventional training methods had to be employed. We're thankful for this unusual training setting and that we're able to continue as these skills are very important to have.



East Kootenay Regional Science Fair

In BC and the Yukon, 14 regional fairs are part of the over 100 fairs held every year across Canada. Science fairs offer students the opportunity to create original scientific research, innovative projects and develop 21st Century learning skills, critical and create thinking, collaboration

and communication. The Regional Science Fairs were held virtually this year. School District 5 had 2 participants this year. Both were selected to be finalists in the Canada Wide Virtual Science Fair held in Ottawa.

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DSAC Update



Ozobots Evo - Coding with Lines - EIDES Kindergarten

Lego Coding Express - Coding with Colors

Kindergarten students from EIDES had opportunities to express their creativity and imagination at the Design Lab. They coded trains to make then stop, go, turn on a light and make a sound using the new Lego Coding Express kits. They also learned how to control a robot by drawing lines for the robot to follow. Ms. Green's class drew a map of Fernie for the Ozobot to travel through. One group included a drawing of a chairlift for the Ozobot to reach the top of the mountain.









Makey and Scratch Video Games

Ms. McMullan's Grade 5 class at Rocky Mountain Elementary, under the guidance of teacher librarian Ms. Hansen, designed and programmed a video game using the Scratch coding platform. The game took a few weeks to code and design. After the games were completed, students created a game controller using Makey Makeys and conductive materials to use with their game. Some groups made buttons out of Play Doh and a few students used fruit to control their game.

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Ozobot Evo at Rocky Mountain and FJ Mitchell

Ms. Stremecki's Grade 2 class at Rocky Mountain Elementary had an introductory session on Ozocode coding. Each group drew a map of Elkford with at least 3 places. At each place on the map, they programmed the Ozobot to perform a specific function such as spinning, driving zig zag, backwards, and more.

Ms. Schultz's grade 3 and 4 class at Frank J Mitchell learned how to program an

Ozobot using lines and colored patterns. The next day they listened to a reading of "Creepy Carrots" and coded their bots to drive in sequence to each part of the story using a story map. Students then used the Ozocode to program the Evo bots to follow the perimeter of the continent using lines and colored patterns.





3D Printing Fernie Secondary and Frank J Mitchell

Mr. Preston's grade 11 IT class designed parts and components of various objects of their choosing using the Tinkercad platform. Mr. Preston sent the prints to the FLC design lab for printing. Students learned about scale, proportion, dimensions, and work planes. Students will be given the completed prints to assemble and assess the accuracy of their measurements and tolerances.

Mrs. Chiasson's Grade 4 class learned about measurement, dimensions, proportion, estimating and scale when they designed bubble wands in Tinkercad. They uploaded their completed design to a shared One Drive folder for printing at the FLC design lab. They also visited the design lab for a day of Lego Wedo robotics and were able to pick up their 3D printed wands. Some tested out their wands and many were successful!



Advanced Agriculture

Students at Parkland were treated to some cricket cupcakes. The students learned how to use a set of Microbits and Climate Action Kit circuit boards to water plants and feed crickets. They learned how to program pumps and designed concept irrigations systems that were able to run autonomously. They let the systems run for a few weeks, harvesting the greens along the way. Once the crickets had grown a bit, they put them in the freezer, an ethical way of putting them to sleep, and then used them to make cupcakes. Yum!



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The Fourth Little Pig Built His House Out of Cardboard

Grade 1 students at TM Roberts Elementary put on a play earlier this year about "Les Trois Petits Cochons". When it came time to decide on a design project, it was easy to choose a cardboard house building challenge.

The students used the Make-Do kits and cardboard to build houses that wouldn't blow over in the howling wind of the Big Bad Wolf, a powerful fan. Make-Do kits contain kid friendly tools like screwdrivers, plastic screws and safety saws that are made for building with cardboard. Many of the designs survived the wind test while a few toppled over. Everyone had a blast chanting and watching everyone's designs being built and tested. Check out the video!



Students from Highlands Elementary took to the green screen at the design lab to act out short skits to demonstrate their French they learned in their core French class. The short skits consisted of short phrases they learned to pronounce. Filming, editing, and using special effects enhanced their project and added a lot of engagement and enjoyment to the project. Wood Shop at Jaffray School

Mr. Fennema worked with his Grade 7 and 8 students on drafting plans for building boxes. The students started by making their own two perspective drafted plans then completed the boxes from the plans they created.

Mr. Fennema also hosted students from Ms. Seward's Grade 5/6 class in the wood shop. The students participated in a STEM activity where they designed 2 dimensional representations of a favourite creature and then converted it back to a 3-dimensional figure using simple shapes and going through the engineering design process.



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Inclusive Partnerships

CBT Basin Plays School Grants

Through the Columbia Basin Trust (CBT) Basin PLAYS Schools grant, schools can apply for up to \$2,500 to provide opportunities for students to explore and experience physical activities and sports in their communities. This could include active outdoor field trips, community sport and active leisure programs, and Indigenous traditional teachings and games. Many of our schools applied for and received this grant again this year.

Jaffray Elementary Junior Secondary School applied for and received grant money. A portion of this grant money was used to allow their secondary students to go to the community fitness centre and golf course. Pictures shown are from their visit to the fitness centre in the fall prior to when they had to wear masks in their cohorts. In May and June, they will visit the local golf course.





On March 4, the Outdoor Education class at Sparwood Secondary School cross-country skied to the Montane Hut in Fernie utilizing funds we received from the CBT plays grant. The trip was the culmination of their nutritional unit and involved meal planning, prepping, and determining the nutritional needs of each individual on such an excursion. While at the hut, the students took part in team building activities and worked on their leadership skills. The students pushed their boundaries, successfully accomplishing the 8km loop and had a fantastic time doing so!



A Year of COVID-19: Taking Stock and Looking Forward




Human Resources is pleased to bring a number of webinars to our employees via ZOOM and facilitated by our EFAP provider FSEAP. Starting May 5 employees will be able to access the first of 3 sessions "A Year of COVID-19: Taking Stock and Looking Forward" This one hour session supports participants to reflect back on pandemic experiences over the last year identifying challenges overcome, skills developed and silver linings. The workshop will also take a look ahead at how to cope with the next phase, what ways we could reconnect, and what are some practical tools to consolidate experiences and move forward guided by

core values. In addition, the facilitator will discuss best practices to maintain balance during

transitions and build capacity for post-traumatic growth and resilience.

Watch your emails for two future webinars being offered:

Empowering the Compassionate Self: Having compassion for the self and others has profound effects on our mental health and our ability to cope with difficult situations. In our work or at home, being able to see through an empathic and compassionate lens allows for a more successful interaction for all. Transforming our view increases understanding and raises awareness of ourselves and others' unique



situations. It allows for calmer and more objective decisions and for more meaningful positive communication and interpersonal relationships. This session will discuss how to approach interactions from a position of compassion. Attendees will gain a deeper understanding on how to move from emotional defensive reactions to make use of their most potent tools for responding to difficult interactions, which is compassion and empathy. Furthermore, the session will offer techniques that attendees can use for regulating their emotions and communicating more positively.

Stress and Anxiety Management: This session provides attendees with a deeper understanding of anxiety and warning signs of stress and compassion fatigue. The facilitator will explain why experiencing anxiety and stress are normal in certain situations, and discuss techniques and tools that attendees can use to cope with their anxiety. This session also goes into the importance of self-care and how to expand personal self-care practices.

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Cranbrook's Irene Bischler to receive BC Government's Medal of Good Citizenship

Irene Bischler has been described as one of the most compassionate, selfless and empathetic people who has ever worked at Cranbrook's Amy Woodland Elementary School. Irene is the first person in the building every morning. She sets up the breakfast club for the school, feeding 30 to 40 kids every morning and greets kids who may not have otherwise been fed or had a positive interaction that day. She has made connections with restaurants, service groups, grocery stores and other community members and gathers donations on her own time to ensure the breakfast club runs smoothly.

After breakfast Irene starts social emotional support groups where kids cook, do carpentry, sew, decorate cakes and cookies, quilt blankets and dozens of other activities. She supports teachers in classrooms and often takes kids into the community for activities. Her goal each day is to ensure kids are happy, emotionally regulated

and connected to the school community. Irene has supported every level of athlete through her power skating and figure skating coaching. She has given respite care to kids to help out families in crisis.

Irene has also worked with individuals with special needs for many years. She mentors young teachers and education assistants and has worked with students in an alternate program. Irene is the local president of the CUPE Union and is constantly working to ensure her members are supported despite the high stress situations they find themselves working in.

Irene's mission is to ensure the people around her have a better day, greater opportunity, feel empowered and valued and have a deeper purposeful connection with their community. The lives of students, staff, families and coworkers are richer and more fulfilling due to her endless energy and efforts. Way to go Irene!





Elkford Secondary Senior Art



Across the District, students and staff celebrated Earth Week (April 19-23).


- Ms. Murray's grade 2 class spent a lovely sunny afternoon cleaning up the community and observing local wetlands.
